Current Municipal Recycling Contract

- Municipal Recycling Services Agreement
 - April 24, 2018 Agreement executed with Republic Services
 - Effective January 1, 2019
 - Set to expire December 31, 2024
 - Includes:
 - Traditional single sort curbside recycling
 - Centralized Recycling Drop Off Site
 - Garbage and Recycling services to City facilities
 - Participation in the annual Spring Drop Off Day



Recycling Market

- Pre 2018 Recycling Market was very strong
 - Strong demand for recyclables world-wide
 - Recyclers sold to profitable marketplace
- 2017 Solicitation for current contract resulted in favorable pricing
- 2018 Asian markets stopped accepting North American recyclables
- 2018 Current
 - Pricing reflects weakened international markets
 - Labor shortages, increasing regulation and inflation cause pricing increases



County Regulation

- Hennepin County Ordinance 13
 - Regulates the separation of Mixed Recyclables and Organic Material
 - Consistent with Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) in its Metropolitan Solid Waste Management Policy Plan
 - City's Curbside Collection program must accept single sort mixed recyclables
 - Cities shall provide the opportunity to participate in Curbside Collection of Organic Material to residential households
 - City Organized, or private haulers



MN Pollution Control Agency

- MPCA Issued a letter clarifying confusion of curbside organics collection charges
- Recycling includes the process of collecting recyclable materials.
 Recyclable materials include source-separated compostable materials, materials separated from MSW for the purpose of composting, and sole source food waste streams
- Minn. Stat. § 115A.03
- A licensing authority shall prohibit mixed municipal solid waste collectors from imposing a greater charge on residents who recycle than on residents who do not recycle.



Revised Fee Structure

- When licensed garbage haulers were required by Hennepin County to begin offering curbside organics recycling collection to residents in 2022, haulers independently determined collection services and pricing regulations
- With the MPCA Clarification of Minnesota Statute 115A.93, haulers to charge all residential customers a fee for curbside organics recycling collection regardless of whether they utilize the service.



Organics Curbside Collection

With all residential customers being charged for organics collection in 2024,
 the at Council Direction, the staff began exploring organized organics

collection

Survey Results

- The Website Survey had 1,638 respondents
- FlashVote had 941 respondents
- Most respondents:
 - Currently throw organics in the garbage
 - Don't have a strong reasoning preventing them from participating in curbside organics collection
 - Approximately 10% want to maintain private curbside organics collection
 - Between 40% and 50% indicated interest in participating in, and preferred City organized curbside organic collection

- Prices are proposed contract prices
- Upcoming Rate Study will determine individual resident rates for ancillary solid waste items



Organized Curbside Organic Collection Pricing

Maximum Participation Percentage (% of homes with an organics cart)	Monthly Price Per Home (all 26,000 homes)	
10	\$3.00	
15	\$3.50	
20	\$4.00	
25	\$4.50	
30	\$5.00	
40	\$5.50	
50	\$6.00	

- The organics price will increase as more residents participate in the organics collection program.
- Fair pricing for both the city and Republic Services



Next Steps

- Staff to receive direction whether to continue contract negotiations,
 with or without city led curbside collection of organic material
- If favorable of negotiations:
 - Municipal Recycling Contract finalized and brought to Council for consideration late 2023
 - Ancillary contract items finalized
 - Prepare for organics line item to be added to utility billings
 - Prepare to rollout organics program, including communications
- If not favorable of negotiations:
 - Staff will prepare for 2024 solicitation of the contract
