



Q2 How interested are you in Plymouth history? (946 responses by )



As an archivist myself, my concern would be that the building appears quite old and seems to be a wood structure. I'm concerned about fire risks and question the wisdom of having city official documents stored there. Anything on display there should be high quality copies of the originals (documents, photos, etc.) while the originals are stored more safely in a permanent storage probably at City Hall.

Historic activities to Teach kids, Millennials and GenZ how settlers manually cleared fields and land to grow crops and gardens - physical work by HAND and horse and plow - NO machines. Limited variety fruits/vegies grown - short growing season in Minnesota. They ate vine-ripened fruits and vegies. Limited variety of produce readily available in grocery stores compared to what they see daily shipped in from other countries. Folks had to raise own meat, or hunt for meat, and grow own food and then preserve their own home grown produce and meat. "Teach Home Canning classes for all produce and meat. And sausage making." Old timers didn't waste food like today. NO readily available mangos, Avocados, green salads or protein powder smoothies or specialties. NO Blenders or KitchenAid mixer.
